ENGAGEMENT AND ACHIEVEMENT:

- 2018 Analysis of Variance highlights
 - in the Junior school, the proportion of learners performing below their expected achievement level continues to reduce, Maori learners make up the largest group of learners making the required shift to perform above their expected achievement level
 - NCEA provisional results indicate 2018 Year 11 learners are now the largest of any previous cohort to perform below their achievement level
 - In contrast, the 2018 Year 13 learners are now the cohort that have made the most significant improvement towards performing above their expected level of achievement, especially Maori and NZ European in NCEA L3
 - Y9 continues to be the largest cohort attending school regularly (90%+ attendance rate) while Y11, becomes for the first time, the cohort with the smallest proportion of learners attending school regularly
 - Compared to previous years, for the first time, most Y11 learners remained at school for the entire year and returned to Y12 in 2019
 - Similarly, for the first time, most Y12 learners remained at school for the entire year and returned to Y13 in 2019
 - While Stand-downs and engagement referrals to SLT remain similar to previous trends, Suspensions increased significantly because of three unrelated incidents but all occurring in Term 4, 2018
